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I. Introduction

Destiny has integrated a for-profit and nonprofit model, which disrupts the cycles of exploitation that countless girls and young women in Kolkata face.

Destiny focuses on every step of the process of human trafficking, provide prevention, rehabilitation, and reintegration.

When working with our beneficiaries, we seek to keep them out of the cycle of trafficking while helping them to build a new life. Our approach provides our beneficiaries with the following three critical pillars of support:



We use these principles to serve girls and young women from their date of arrival to the moment that they are ready to move out on their own.

This focus on ensuring care from childhood to adulthood lowers the potential for retrafficking while also fostering prevention of common exploitative scenarios.



At Destiny we often say "one life at a time" because we believe in the power of investing in long-term support.

The Situation Today

Human trafficking is one of the most exploitative and violent problems facing societies around the world today.



Human trafficking can be defined as: "the use of force, fraud, or coercion to obtain some type of labor or commercial sex act."


Trafficking is on the rise for many reasons such as:







This has resulted in an estimate that 40.3 million people are currently entrapped in a form of human trafficking today.







III. Volunteers and Interns



At Destiny, we have developed long term relationships with institutions and volunteers to continue effectuating our mission. Our interns and volunteers are one of the best aspects of our work at Destiny.

In 2019-2020, we hosted several interns from our partner universities. They used their skills and energy to improve our operations and run programmes for the participants. We also were able to catch up with some familiar faces at conferences throughout the year!

IV. Programmes

Destiny has designed its programmes with the sole purpose of assisting our women and girls in achieving **sustainable** independence

Our motto is to end modern slavery.

We work to free women from sexual exploitation and the potential for falling prey to re-trafficking by fostering **empowerment** and **rehabilitation**. To do so, we use a three-tiered model:



We implement this model in our three main projects:



Group Home Programme

At just 18 years of age, girls are often forced to leave the government shelter homes. Many lack the necessary support structures of family, friends, or employment, and thus struggle to live on their own for the first time. This project provides shelter, job training, and basic necessities for young women who have been rescued from human trafficking.

Khidderpore Community Center

We run a community centre in the heart of the Munshiganj Red Light Area in Kolkata. We offer a variety of social and wellness events, such as sewing training, literacy classes, and business workshops. The purpose of this programme is to improve general well-being in the community with the goal of strengthening their empowerment.



Government Home Project



The Indian Government provides hundreds of shelter homes in West Bengal children have been rescued from a variety of traumatic situations, including sex trafficking, child labour, child marriage, domestic violence, and homelessness. We provide enhanced social services in one government shelter home for girls. We provide arts and crafts programmes, as well as literacy and job-skill training.

Living Proof: Sonia's Story

Originally from a village in Northern India, Sonia was the oldest of her three siblings. Unfortunately, her father was an abusive alcoholic who would mercilessly abuse her mother and his children. Being unable to bear this abuse, Sonia's mother ran away to protect her children. When Sonia turned 13 years old, she began work in a factory. This same year, Sonia was introduced to her future husband, who would frequently visit her family and provide them with assistance.

At just 13 years old, Sonia was married and brought to her husband's home in Bihar. When she arrived, she realized that she was his second wife. Her husband abandoned her with his family, who then forced her to do all of the household labor and starved her and beat her. She was forced into prostitution in the village.

Sonia escaped, but was not safe. As a vulnerable child, she became entrapped in human trafficking through three fake marriage schemes. She was finally rescued during a CID raid from a brothel in Bihar. It was at this time that she joined us at Destiny.

Even in the safety of Destiny, Sonia still faced many difficulties. She struggled with her mental health and had poor physical health. Sonia received the care of our trustworthy community and overcame her pain to successfully complete our empowerment training. Her hard work and strong spirit are a testament to the work of Destiny and our beneficiaries.

V. Operations: Events and Activities

A gathering of approximately 50 people to generate donations and promote learning through the film Stolen Innocence.




Event: Breaking the Chains of Modern Slavery

VII. Impact

The programs of 2018-2019 had a large impact in our communities. With our monthly programs and our events, we have provided employment and built a strong network of partnerships with the following universities:



By using our three pillar model of fostering a (1) trusted community, (2) safe accommodation, and (3) economic empowerment, we have seen incredible results for the women with whom we work. Our reach has grown and we are achieving our goal of lowering a participant's probability of being re-trafficked.

Thus far, we have reached 1,314 participants.

The following figures demonstrate our overall impact on both the well-being and continued security of our beneficiaries.



95% of our beneficiaries felt optimistic about the future. 98% of our beneficiaries were not re-trafficked.
